



Your Opinion Counts

Have you ever heard about a new law and wondered, 'What were they thinking?' Conversely, have you wondered, 'Why doesn't someone do something about that?'

Now is your chance to be heard. The GFWC Legislation Action Center can notify you by email whenever there is legislation that impacts you, your family, and our country. Examples of issues include human trafficking, safety for children, and much more.

As part of the Seven Grand Initiatives proposed by our International President, Mary Ellen Brock, our goal across the country is to have 1,000 more members sign up for these alerts.

Here's how you participate: Go to the GFWC website at www.gfwc.org. Click on What We Do. Click on Legislative Action Center under Public Policy. Click again on Legislative Action Center. Look to the right and find Join the Legislative Action Center box called Join Now. Fill out your information. Be sure to use your home address so they can locate the legislators for your area.

IMPORTANT! Be sure to scroll down once you have filled out your information and click on the Email Opt-In, then click Register.

On an occasional basis, you will receive an email asking for your support or opposition for a legislative item. You can read about it and decide if you would like to participate.

GFWC will have already written the letter and knows which legislator covers your area. All you do is follow the instructions, and the letter will be forwarded. Upon completion, you will receive an email thanking you for participating.

Be sure to check on the right side of the email once you finish to see if there are any other legislative items for which you would like to participate by forwarding a GFWC letter. It's easy and it helps our organization make a difference. Be part of the 1,000 members to sign up this year! We signed up members at the November Orange District meeting and appreciate those who participated. If you need help signing up, please contact me.
